Hello Clive,

This is not true as this is third party personal information which is being requested. Section 40 of the Freedom of Information Act requires that we consider whether the data protection principles will be breached if we release personal data. The personal data in this case is:

- The degree granted
- The supervisor's name.

The main data protection principle is the first, relating to fairness. We have to consider if it will be fair to release personal data relating to another individual. Regarding the degree, this is fair to release as it is usually in the student's interests to confirm they received the degree they are saying they received. There will be negative consequences for them if we don't. Regarding the supervisor's name, this would not normally be fair because the School does not release the names of teaching staff on a regular basis and there would be an expectation from staff that their names were not released. However, as the supervisor is dead, data protection no longer

applies. You have to be a living individual. So the supervisor's name in this instance could be released.

Fol is not a complete right to information anyway, there are exemptions and other reasons we can refuse e.g. vexatious requests. I suggest linking to the ICO's website for more information <u>www.ico.org.uk</u> as a further resource.

The supervisor passed away in 2016 and hadn't been at LSE since 1984. I feel as though, if he were alive, we would need his permission to release his name. But as Ing-Wen Tsai is the current president of Taiwan do we need to release this?
