We can confirm that President Tsai successfully completed a PhD at LSE in 1984. for my personal matter, but for some legal truth. Many young Ph.D.s in Taiwan like me are playing Sherlock Holmes to crack the mystery of President Ing-wen Tsai's LSE Ph.D. degree.

In this email, I attached a few Ms. Tsai's LSE documents (which she said provided by LSE). However, these documents did not solve people's doubts about her LSE certificate but aroused even more suspicion.

First of all, Ms. Tsai had three Ph.D. certificates that she obtained from 1984, 2010 and 2015 -- How come LSE issued her so many certificates at different times? Are they all legitimate? My second question is, some important documents are lacking signatures of the persons in charge -- Are these documents coming from LSE? Without signatures, are they legitimate? (Attached documents are published by the President's spokesman on his FB and in a press conference.)

I am very sorry if this email is bothering you or LSE, but this matter has caused much disturbance in Taiwan's society in the past few months. Families and friends fought with each other or broke off relations because of this. It has become it is either LSE's fault (missing Ms. Tsai's thesis in three libraries, issuing documents without signatures, missing details between 1983-84 in the student record) or it is Ms. Tsai's fault (if she did not follow the right procedure to get her Ph.D. degree). How could she graduate without a principle supervisor after 1982 as shown in the student record? (It is said that her supervisor Mr. Michael Elliot left LSE in 1982.)
